INTERNATIONAL SPOTLIGHT

The Rotary Club of Hinnerup, Denmark

In 1991, the Rotary Clubs of Orangevale and Citrus Heights co-hosted an exchange student from Denmark, Anna Brams. Her home town was a small village (12,000 people) named Hinnerup, in Aarhus County. Hinnerup is soon to be joined with three other villages into a single municipality named Favrskov. The Rotary club has 32 members, and meets Monday evenings.

In 1992, the Buntins visited Anna at her home, and spent several days as guests of her family. They were also made to feel at home by the members of the Rotary club, who greeted them with a small soiree at another member's home. The Buntins and all of the area exchange students were feted with a grand party at the Rotary's own clubhouse, culminating in a 4 a.m. stroll to the bakery for fresh morning rolls. (The clubhouse is actually owned by a trust comprised of Rotary members, and, if the building were ever sold, the profits would go to the club.) The Rotary members also invited the Buntins to join them on a canoe trip on a lazy Denmark river.

The Hinnerup Rotary Club members have shared other trips, such as one to Italy, when 29 people toured wineries and factories. These folks have a very good time with each other!

Their current international project involves adopting four families in China. The project will be coordinated with the local government, who will advise the Hinnerup club about legal issues, and will provide local support. The club will buy 4 apartments for the families to live in. Each family will be required to adopt two children (besides their own one child), and to ensure that the children get a good education.

The club will have to buy the apartments and find sponsors to support the families over a 15-year period. The expected cost is \$10,000/year, which will be raised by selling \$300 notes. Under the Danish taxation system, sponsors will be able to write off the donation. Given the tax rate of 65%, the donation will actually be very cheap!
